

Title: Kenn Nesbitt Poetry Week	Grade: 3rd Grade
Content: Poetry	Duration: Five Days

Standard:

- **RL.3.13:** Read and comprehend poetry appropriate for Grade 3.
- **RF.3.4:** Read with sufficient accuracy and fluency to support comprehension.
- **RL.3.6:** Distinguish their own point of view from that of the narrator.

Objective:

Students will respond to two different poems by choosing 5 activities from the choice board.

Introduction Description:

Students will explore the poetry of Kenn Nesbitt and choose ways to respond creatively.

Steps:

- **Choose one task from the choice board each day for 5 days.**

Adaptations (optional):

Students could:

- Choose fewer tasks.
- Complete all the tasks.
- Complete the task board in fewer or more days.
- Create their own task to respond to the poems.
- Another person could read poems aloud to students.

Finished Product:

Students will have completed 5 tasks from the choice board; can share with their teachers by sharing photos or work online (*if possible*).
